1. In the studies on biblical worldviews in America that Dr. Schultz referenced, how did the surveys define a "biblical worldview"?

How does the Barna study define a biblical worldview and whether or not an individual has a biblical worldview?

Glen's Response

I have talked with Dr. Barna about this and he shared some of the basic tenets of what would be considered a biblical worldview. It is defined by key basic biblical truths of the Christian faith.

2. How do I handle a case of a Muslim parent who decides to bring their children to our Christian school. and what percentage of Muslim students can I allow in our school not to pollute our Christian environment

We get a lot of Catholics in our school; how do we bring them to know the Lord without getting into pushing religion

Glen's Response

These two questions are quite similar. We tried to answer these in the live Q&A. I would add that it is important to study and think through Biblical Principle #11 on the list of KE principles that are available to download from the KSI website. It reads that the major focus of our education must be on knowing God. As we integrate this principle into our lives and our teaching, we won't be "pushing religion" but sharing truth that the Holy Spirit can use to bring conviction and draw students to God.

3. What happens or how do you cope when your process seems to be getting too long even when you have tried all you could, and it is like nothing is working.

Please pray for me. 15 plus years teaching and want to just give up.

What do you do When you find yourself in a school where you expecting everyone to be Children of GOD and you speak act and behave thus and expect everyone to be thus but not and now you are getting discouraged. What do you do?

Glen's Response

We addressed the first question in the live session. However, the other two questions/statements are in the same vein of struggling and not seeing results. We must always remember that what we do as teachers is a sowing ministry. We may never see the fruits of our labor this side of heaven. Sometimes students do not grasp the truths that we are teaching until they are out in adulthood. I have been in this battle long enough to have had the privilege of seeing young people walk with the Lord as adults when they never showed any signs of spiritual life while in school. Like we said in the live session, we must not grow weary in well doing knowing that God will bring the harvest in His timing. We need to pray for one another and realize that the battle will only intensify in the days ahead. But God is sovereign and in control. His purpose for us is perfect. Another KE principle is number 12 on the list about seeing work as a vocation and not merely a job. Stay strong. God will not forsake you.

4. How do I shape the worldview of my child?

Glen's Response

This is a very important question. We must be intentional in renewing our own minds and developing a biblical worldview. BJ Press has developed a Biblical Worldview textbook for high school students. It is

one of the best I have reviewed. I have been recommending it to adults to go through in developing their own worldview.

Also, Dr. Josh Mulvihill has written a great book for parents as a guide to helping them instill a biblical worldview in their children's hearts. The title is simply, *Biblical Worldview* and you can find it on Renew's website (www.renewanation.org) under the store tab.

5. Do you have any recommendations for a worldview assessment that can be used by our staff to evaluate where we are as a school so we know where we need to grow and refocus our thinking?

Glen's Response

Milton's Response

- You must recalibrate your mindset and adjust your expectation. Discouragement is intrinsic. Outside sources or circumstances should not affect the way that you feel, act, and perceive. You can only control what you can control and that would be yourself. Let your Christlikeness be so evident that it causes others to thirst and hunger for him. And when feeling discouraged do as David did when he arrived at Ziklag and had to face a sad picture. The Bible says, "and David encouraged himself in the Lord his God and in Him found strength".
